



BOAT RACES

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

- Design and build a boat that is controlled by radio control, where its power source must come from batteries.
- The boat will run on a water track without obstacles, in a previously marked circuit, competing directly against other boats.

TECHNICAL CHARACTERISTICS OF THE BOAT

All the boats must have the following characteristics:

- **1.** The power source must come from a battery.
- 2. Any type of motor that is battery powered is allowed.
- **3.** More than one motor per boat is allowed. There are no restrictions on engine type (direct engine and/or gearboxes allowed in all classes).
- **4.** The hull can be made of any material.
- **5.** Only water propellers are allowed. There are no restrictions on propeller material, number of blades, etc.
- **6.** The maximum dimensions are 15.75 inches x 9.84 inches, with no height restriction.
- 7. It must be operated remotely by a radio-control device.
- **8.** You must be able to stop the engine completely.
- **9.** It must have an externally mounted electric motor kill switch clearly marked ON/OFF.
- 10. Only one pilot per boat is allowed.

HOMOLOGATION

- 1. Your boat must include all the characteristics specified in these rules.
- 2. The boat must be capable of traversing the race track, without any assistance.
- 3. Boats that do not have these specifications will be disqualified from the competition. There won't be an option for replacement later.





COMPETITION DEVELOPMENT

- 1. The boats will be placed in the "start" area. Once the competitors receive the "go" sign, they can begin to advance.
- 2. No part of the boat may be in motion before the "go" sign. If any part of the boat is in motion before that action, the boat will be disqualified.
- 3. The competition will take place on the water course with three boats competing at the same time.
- 4. The boat that finishes the race first wins.
- 5. The races will have a length of maximum 10 minutes.

EVALUATION

- a. The judge will determine the number of qualifying rounds according to the number of homologated boats at the time of the competition.
- b. The time of the boats that manage to complete the course of the competition will be counted. The best boats of each round will qualify for the next phase.
- c. In case no boat finishes the race during the rounds, the positions will be determined for the closest boat to the finish line when the time is up.
- d. If there is a "false start", the race will start again.
- e. The following actions will cause a warning for the boat:
 - 1. Start before the "go" sign.
 - 2. Any unsporting conduct, as well as the use of inappropriate language during the competition, or obscene remarks towards the judges, competitors or any spectator.
 - 3. Claims without justification to the judges.
 - 4. Mistreatment of furniture or work equipment of the competition.
 - 5. Sabotage of the opponents.
 - 6. In case of gathering three (3) cautions, the team will be disqualified.





JUDGES

- I. The role of the judge is important in the competition; he will be in charge of complying with the rules and regulations established by the organizing committee.
- II. The judges for this competition will be appointed by the organizing committee.
- III. Contestants may present their objections to the judge in charge of the category before the end of the competition.
- IV. In case of doubt in the application of the norms, the judge will make the final decision.
- V. In the event of a controversy about the decision of the judge or judges, a written disagreement can be sent to the Council of Judges. Once the competition is over, the arguments presented will be evaluated and a decision will be made in this regard. This is a final decision.
